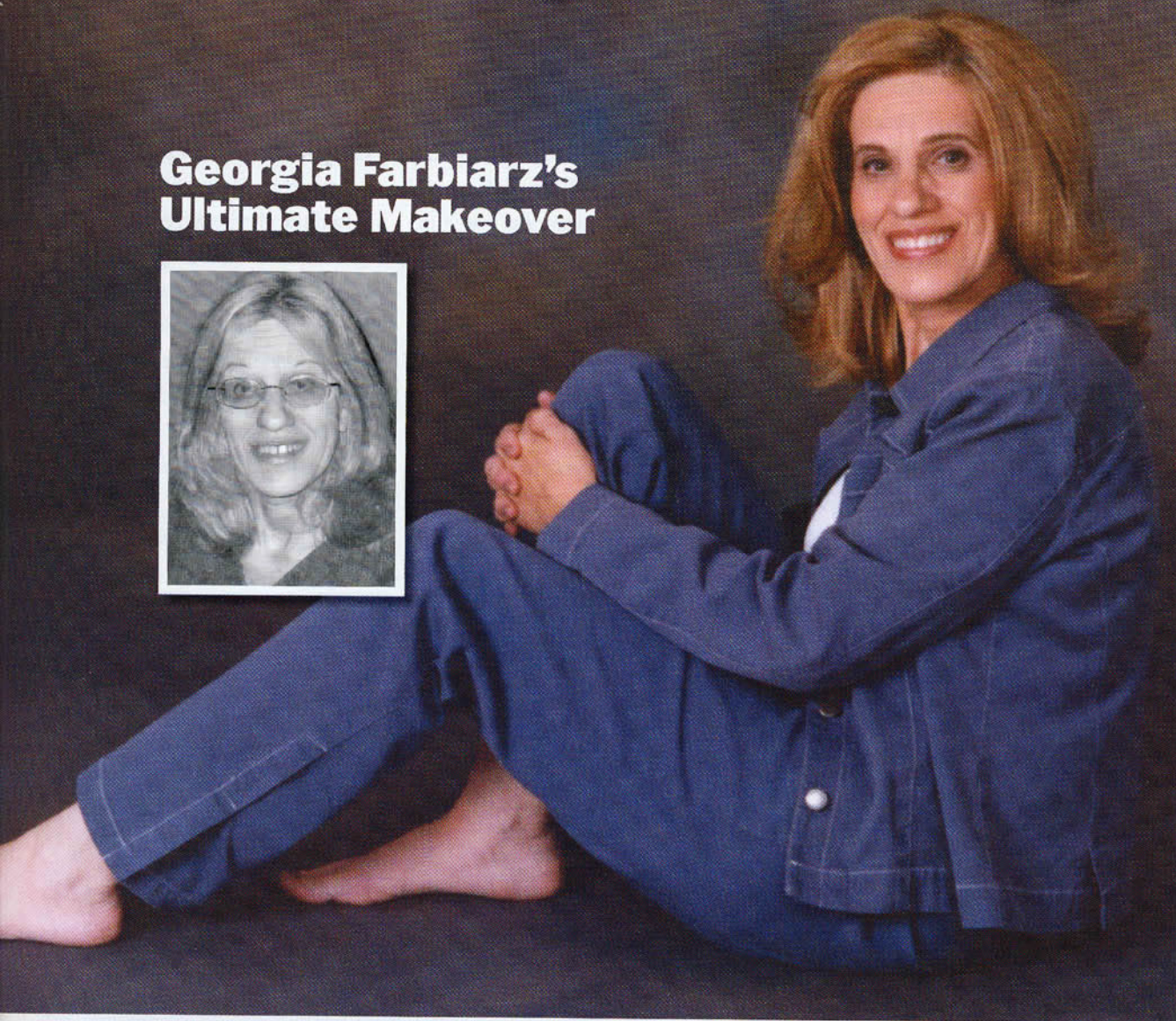


# Sitting Pretty

Less-than-perfect dental features left her uninspired to smile. Financially unable to join a fitness center, Farbiarz was in less-than-perfect shape.
